Earth House: Cultivating Sustainability Across School

Earth House Ambassadors work with Frome Town Council. During Frome's 'Big Green Week', Earth House Ambassadors were invited to Frome Town Council's meeting. Cllr Fiona Barrows, lead FTC councillor for climate and the ecological emergency, introduced some of our Earth House ambassadors. Cllr Barrows has been working with College students in recent months, describing them as 'extraordinary, articulate and with so much to say'. She invited Niamh, Tallis, Jack, Belle, Bella and Esme to address the meeting. Niamh, a year 10 student, spoke of the climate anxiety experienced by her generation – 'a looming feeling, like a storm on the horizon of my generation's future' and urged the council to 'walk towards a future with as much investment into the environment as possible'.



Tallis and Esme both spoke about the stigma sometimes experienced by young people, and the unfair presumption that they might shoplift or engage in anti-social behaviour. Clubs, activities and things for young people to do were cited as potential solutions. Jack, a member of Frome canoe club, echoed these thoughts and the issue with smaller clubs gaining the funding they needed to provide activities. Bella spoke about the need for increased biodiversity and green space, and she shared disappointment at the amount of single use plastic on the Frome College site and a littering problem made worse by a lack of recycling bins.

The councillors thanked the students for speaking so eloquently and sharing their ideas. Plans will be made to continue the conversation and work with the students and some of their peers to ensure the voices of young people are heard at FTC.



The DT/Sustainability Club has been meeting once a week this year.

We have been gradually collecting all that we need for our bike charging project. (Term 3 Newsletter) In the meantime, Graham Burgess has supported our students to consider many aspects of design and sustainability. We have created arches using compression forces; investigated tensile structures; and are in the process of making our own gargoyles.

In a recent trip to Innox Hill the team were able to explore an energy efficient home made using local materials that are in keeping with the surroundings, as well as beautiful craftsmanship and sustainable technology.

Earth House and Trees for Schools

June saw the delivery of a new Silver Birch tree from Trees for Schools. The Silver Birch has been planted in the centre of our beautiful campus. We look forward to watching it grow and thrive at the heart of our College community.

Did you know?

Silver birch can be used to improve soil quality. Its widely spread roots bring otherwise inaccessible nutrients into the tree, which are recycled on to the soil surface when the tree sheds its leaves.

Silver birch provides food and habitat for more than 300 insect species – the leaves attracting aphids which provide food for ladybirds and other species further up the food chain. The leaves are also a food plant for the caterpillars of many moths, including the angle-shades, buff tip, pebble hook-tip, and Kentish glory.

EAL – English as an additional language

We are proud to have over 90 students in college who speak English as an additional language. This means that at home, they speak and listen to a language other than English. These students are known as our EAL students. Here are just some of the 20 languages our students speak:



Our EAL students are integral to our school community. We want to celebrate their traditions and learn about their cultures and to make sure that students feel seen, heard and supported. We know that multilingual learners can find communication in school difficult which might lead to a lack of confidence and feeling excluded. We try hard to make sure this doesn't happen by helping create inclusive spaces and activities. Teachers provide different teaching strategies to help students improve their understanding and students have access to translation services and texts in their own language if needed. If available, students are also encouraged to sit GCSE exams in their own languages before year 11.

September will see the start of our termly EAL coffee mornings whereby we invite parents and carers into school to give them a space to share their experiences, gain support, to ask questions and to learn a little more about the education system in the UK.

On the 20th of November we will be celebrating 'a Day of Culture'. The library will host events throughout the day where students and parents will be invited to share traditional food, clothing, artwork and traditions. This coincides with the United Nation's World Children's Day which aims to promote international togetherness. awareness among children worldwide and improving children's welfare.


Adam Silvera: The First to Die at the End:



AIM Programme

with Dr Ruggiero, AIM Lead

This year AIM has hosted over 75 events including speakers, workshops, charity events, day trips, university taster days and residentials. 100% of AIM students in years 12 and 13 attended at least one of our academic workshops and 95% of students in years 9 to 11 attended at least two events. In addition to the super-curricular events we had 35 pairs of year 9 and year 12 mentorships that have lasted for the year. As the AIM coordinator what I am most proud of is the verve and zest that the students show for learning in all contexts from setting up and running a charity event for Guide Dogs for the Blind to serving as role models for our incoming year 8s during our Outreach events. We have seen an uptake in aspirational programmes from Cambridge, Oxford and the University of Bath as well as creating a more contextual offer for our humanities AIM students through cultural trips and experiences. As I leave this post I would like say thank you for your support and to my students- make good choices.



An AIM field trip to the American museum recently saw 24 students exploring mixed media through a collaborative creation of a tapestry.

The session, called 'Art in the Garden' allowed students to use the shapes, colours and textures of the American Museum gardens to create their own piece of art using textiles, thread and paper in conjunction with natural materials such as leaves and sticks.

After the workshop students explored the current exhibit 'American Road Trip' as well as the collection in the museum.

AIM hosted its last outreach event of the year with a Clean Energy STEM day involving Oakfield, Avanti and our year 10 AIM students. Students worked in mixed groups of six to create and market a solar house, pilon system and clean energy motor powered by either water or wind. In addition to costing the items and plotting where they would be best placed on a topographic map, students in each team wired circuits to test their creations and built either a wind turbine or water turbine to house it. Thank you to the Smallpeice Trust for running this workshop.


